A Special Opportunity to participate in a 45-minute original interactive **FREE THIS YEAR** Performance/Workshop that crosses disciplines for 4th through 6th Graders.

Part One of **The Reality Series**, “Dance at the Stone House” features an interactive, site-specific work that uses student participation to design a dance work based on the unusual architecture and art that is the **Sun Valley Youth Arts Center**.

The Center, also known as the Stone House, uses native river rocks set into the architecture and interior of the building to create its structure. Built in 1925 and designated a City Cultural Historical monument the Sun Valley Youth Arts Center is located at **8642 Sunland Blvd., Sun Valley, CA 91352**.

Participating 4th through 6th graders will work in groups of six with one of Louise Reichlin’s dancers to design freezes or movement phrases **inspired by the Arts Center and the art there**. The 10 short phrases created will then be integrated into the original dance.

The students may bring a brown bag lunch for after the performance.
